DALLAS COLORED BIBLE SCHOOL (1927-1937)

Our Origin Story: In 1927, Reverend L. G. Foster, Sr., then employed as an elevator operator at the Magnolia Building in Downtown Dallas, recounted the genesis of our institution as follows:

"I was walking down Elm Street and I saw some white men who were there at Stone Place. They were preaching and I had never heard the Bible preached so profoundly. I waited and listened. I wanted to know where they had gotten so much knowledge about the Bible.

They told me that they were from Evangelical Theological College [now Dallas Theological Seminary]. I knew that I couldn't attend that school because I was colored, but I asked them if they would teach me. Finally, after many days of listening and much persistence, they introduce me to Mr. Edmond H. Ironside, who was also a student of the college and owned a bookstore."

Edmond Ironside agreed to work with L. G. Foster and they became good friends. Impressed by Ironside's teachings, Foster soon encouraged other African-American preachers to join their study group. Thus, Dallas Colored Bible School was born, marking the inception of our beloved college.

SOUTHERN BIBLE TRAINING SCHOOL (1937-1976)

The first name change is documented on the original Articles of Incorporation filed with the Texas Secretary of State in 1937.

SOUTHERN BIBLE INSTITUTE (1976-2017)

This name change was officially filed with the Texas Secretary of State in 1976 and came into use at that time. However, the name change was not amended in the Articles of Incorporation until 2009.

SOUTHERN BIBLE INSTITUTE & COLLEGE (2017-PRESENT)

On October 18, 2017, the Board of Directors voted to add '& College' to the name and implemented it into public use in 2018. This change was officially filed with the Texas Secretary of State in 2019.

Removing 'Institute' from the name will distinguish our core undergraduate programs from other non-collegiate level training opportunities.

SHORTENING THE LENGTH OF OUR NAME

A shorter name is easier to remember, pronounce, and incorporate into promotional and marketing materials.



G. Foster, Sr.,—it is hereby recommended to the Board of Directors that Southern Bible Institute & College be officially and legally renamed:

FOSTER COLLEGE

This new name pays respectful homage to the legacy and resilience of a humble, unassuming African-American preacher whose commitment to being an learned steward of the Gospel has steadfastly reverberated for nearly a century.

The name 'Foster College' sufficiently addresses the multiple reasons noted for renaming the college. It also maintains an important historic link to the college's beginning while allowing for unbounded growth, innovation, and impact.

2025

New Name Effective Date: July 1, 2025 Afterwhich - Inform other government, accreditation, and necessary entities of name change; Open new business and bank accounts etc.; hard roll-out name change to public.

2026

"Great Gathering" Stakeholders Event: May 2026 At this event - Delegate participants will assist in determining the new college's: colors, logo, mascot, alma mater, special tradition(s), etc.; First class to graduate under new name.

2027

Centennial Anniversary: Jan - Dec 2027 Celebrate 100th Anniversary unveiling new: presidential medallion, mace, paraphernalia, etc.
